Confronting Systemic Sexual Violence

Every 98 seconds, someone in the U.S. is sexually assaulted.

With so many survivors sharing their experiences of sexual assault and harassment through the **YERYONE'S** #MeToo movement, we are at a watershed moment. It is the moment to acknowledge that sexual

violence is not about a few "bad apples." It is about a culture in which sexual harassment and assault are glorified and considered part of normal

"boys being boys" behavior. These behaviors are not OK- they are dangerous; they are demeaning and oppressive; they are learned and they can be stopped.

What you can do: Believe survivors. Have hard conversations with people in your life who weren't aware sexual violence was a pervasive problem. Advocate for services for survivors and prevention education for our children. Speak out when you can (and trust yourself when you feel you can't). Don't give up. Get involved (see Actions below!). Remember you are not alone.

Support MA Campus Sexual Assault Bills

This is not a time to be rolling back sexual assault protections. The Department of Education has released a troubling FAQ that weakens federal requirements for schools to respond to assault allegations in trauma-informed ways. But state efforts are fighting back.

The MA Senate passed a campus sexual violence response bill (S.2191) that strengthens protections for survivors. Rep. Tricia Farley-Bouvier of Pittsfield has been instrumental in promoting the MA House version of the bill (H.632), which has yet to be voted on. Please call on your state representatives to advance the MA House bill.

1 in 5 women and 1 in 16 men are sexually assaulted while in college, and we know that more than 90% of sexual assault victims on college campuses do not report the assault. We must do better.

Lift the Cap on Kids

The Cap on Kids, also called the Family Cap, denies welfare benefits to children conceived while or soon after the family received benefits.

The cap negatively impacts the most vulnerable children and families in our state, especially survivors of domestic violence. It currently deprives about 8,900 children of essentials like diapers and warm winter clothes.

In exciting news, bills to Lift the Cap on Kids (H. 85 and S. 34) have advanced to the House and Senate Ways and Means Committees. Please call your state senators and representatives to ask them to urge Leadership to advance these bills.


